

First Impressions *can* make an impact..



And some other things to consider..

WHAT? The person reading your application might not know anything about your organisation/programme.

Try to emphasise HOW your programme/activities will use sport to make positive changes.

WHY? Do not assume that your programme meets needs – try to ensure co-design with participants and refer to relevant statistics, and aim to use the application as an opportunity to show why it should be funded.
